Measure appliance energy use

CEC members can get ahead of their energy use by taking advantage of some of the cooperative's free tools to analyze and reduce their energy consumption. One such free tool is the Kill A Watt power meters the cooperative distributed to public libraries throughout its service territory. The libraries loan the power meters to members upon request.

A Kill A Watt power meter is a simple device that members can plug various appliances and electrical devices into to measure the amount of electricity they consume. Measurements are provided in both dollars and in kilowatts.

Each device comes in a box with a booklet explaining how to use the power meter. The booklet also includes common ways to reduce energy use. It's best to leave a device plugged into the power meter for at least a week or so to get the most accurate measurement. Members may be surprised to learn how much their toaster or television costs to use.

If the local library doesn't have any power meters left or doesn't have enough of them, the librarian can call or email TCEC's Member Solutions department to request replacement kits.

Members don't need a Kill A Watt power meter to obtain estimates of appliance energy use. They can access additional tools and resources by going online to www. tcec.coop and looking under the 'Account' tab for the 'Ways to Save' page. This page has information and links to learn ways to save energy and reduce costs. One valuable resource for TCEC members is the www.TogetherWeSave.com website, which offers free online energy use calculators for appliances, lighting, space heaters and televisions.

After using the power meter and reviewing the other free resources mentioned here, members can request a free energy survey of their home by one of TCEC's energy experts. These surveys are performed by a service technician who can help identify specific ways to reduce energy use in a member's home.
